

Presenters and Participants

JoNina M. Abron, associate professor, Department of Communication, Western Michigan University. Currently, Ms. Abron teaches Journalism, English, and Black Studies. She has served as Managing Editor of *The Black Scholar* and published many of her own articles and writings on topics ranging from prison issues to South African labor unions.

Dr. Abdul Alkalimat, professor of Africana Studies and Sociology and director of the Africana Studies, University of Toledo. He offers the only known Internet-based course taught from Africa to students in the U.S. He moderates the largest African-American Studies discussion list, H-Afro-Am.

Ernest Allen, Jr., professor, associate chairman, W.E.B. Du Bois Department of Afro-American Studies, University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He is currently co-editing an anthology of writings on the Black Power Movement of the 1960's.

Dr. Robert Greene, visiting professor, Michigan State University, Department of Black Studies.

Dr. William W. Sales, Jr., chairperson of the Department of African American Studies and director of the Center for African American Studies at Seton Hall University. A recognized expert on Malcolm X, he is the author of the books From Civil Rights to Black Liberation: Malcolm X and the Organization of Afro-American Unity and Southern Africa/Black America: Same Struggle, Same Fight.

V.L. Alston Productions is an Omaha-based production company.

Dr. Joseph L. White, professor emeritus of Psychology and Psychiatry at the University of California-Irvine. He has spent most of his career as a teacher, mentor and director of ethnic studies. He is co-author with James H. Cones, III of *Black Man Emerging*. His 1970 *Ebony* article "Towards Black Psychology" was instrumental in opening the door toward the study of black psychology.
