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The Institute of the Black World (IBW) is a research center staffed by black men and women whose work is based on the conviction that black people must move to control the definition of our past and present if we are to become masters of our future. Established in 1969, IBW has committed itself to doing those selected tasks of research, analysis and advocacy which we feel will advance the struggles of the black community towards self-understanding, self-determination and ultimate liberation.

Programs and Publications

Our work has taken the form of research, writing, and the dissemination of our findings through public forums and publications. In recent years our publishing activities have gradually increased to the point where we now have a monthly newsletter, a monthly editorial column (available to black media), several books, pamphlets and printed articles, and an audio-tape collection. This brochure is a witness to our efforts in the publishing arena.

Our primary task has been to make ideas and analysis available to our people, and it has only been through the receptiveness and encouragement of that community that we have been so far successful.
